Precise and Clear Language. The use of appropriate language is a tricky matter because the meaning of words is relative and situational. In other words, words can be interpreted in different ways by different people in different situations. For this reason, it is important to choose language which is as precise and clear as possible.

EFFECTIVE USE OF LANGUAGE

Inclusive language. Inclusive language – using the words ‘we’ or ‘us’ – is often used to get a reader onside. e.g. “ We might not like it, but our kids’ right to confidential medical advice should take precedence over our right to know about it.” Imagery. Descriptive writing can be a powerful persuasive technique.
