### **Palliative care | RCPCH**

Children's palliative care: Children's palliative care is an active and total approach to care, embracing physical, emotional, social and spiritual elements. It focuses on enhancement of quality of life for the child and support for the whole family and includes the management of distressing

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symptoms, provision of respite and care from diagnosis through death and bereavement.

### **What is Children's Palliative Care? - ICPCN**

Paediatric palliative care (PPC) is care which focuses on the relief of suffering in the child and family by controlling pain and other distressing symptoms, by integrating the psychological and spiritual aspects of care, by offering a support system to allow children and their families to live as active and full a life as possible and by supporting families to help them cope into bereavement.

### **A National Model of Care for Paediatric Healthcare ...**

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3 Effective palliative care provides a direct benefit to the child as well as being an important preventive health intervention for the family, with long term implications for family functioning, mental health, education and employment. The long-term negative effects of grief have been powerfully confirmed through recent experience with bereaved families as part of the Autopsy Inquiry at the Royal Children's Hospital, Melbourne.

## **Paediatric palliative care: development and pilot study of ...**

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Abstract. The objective of this study was to provide a preliminary description of trajectories of life-limiting conditions (LLCs) using qualitative experiential data. Semi-structured interviews were conducted with families of children with LLCs, selected to encompass all Association for Children's Palliative Care (ACT)/Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health (RCPCH) categories, using a schedule developed from focus groups of professionals.
