Physical medicine and rehabilitation (PM&R), or physiatry, is a medical specialty focused on prevention, diagnosis, rehabilitation, and therapy for patients who experience functional limitations resulting from injury, disease, or malformation. Although the specialty is a relatively young one (with beginnings in the early twentieth century), fundamentals of the field originated during ancient times.

Rehabilitation has come to encompass the beliefs that criminals are made, not born, and corrections systems should focus on helping criminals escape the cycle of incarceration, so triggering broad changes in the scope of rehabilitative practice. Modern rehabilitation encompasses hundreds of different programs under thousands of different names.

## **Defining Rehabilitation - Past, Present, Prison**

The rehabilitation model of corrections began in the 1930s and reached its high point in the 1950s. Qualified staff members were expected to diagnose the cause of an offender's criminal behavior, prescribe a treatment to change the individual, and determine when that individual had become rehabilitated.
