Although the origin of the synagogue as a Jewish institution is unclear, by the first century C.E. they were found in both Palestine and the Diaspora, where they were used for a variety of communal needs: as schools (Josephus, Antiquities 16.43), for communal meals (Josephus, Antiquities 14.214-216), as hostels, as courts, as a place to collect and distribute charity, and for political meetings (Josephus, Life 276-289). ## **First Century Synagogues - Bible Odyssey**

Literature of the 1st century CE refers to numerous synagogues not only in Palestine but also in Rome, Greece, Egypt, Babylonia, and Asia Minor. By the middle of that century, all sizable Jewish communities had a synagogue where regular morning, afternoon, and evening services were held, with special liturgies on the Sabbath and on religious festivals.

Reconstructionist Judaism is a modern Jewish movement that views Judaism as a progressively evolving civilization and is based on the conceptions developed by Mordecai Kaplan. The oldest remains of a Palestinian synagogue date from the 1st century CE. After the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem, the local synagogue became its substitute and from Late Antiquity onward, the number of synagogues discovered rise significantly, with over one hundred being unearthed in Palestine alone.

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The movement was also the first to accept patrilineal descent (1968), to ordain gay and lesbian rabbis (1984), and to permit rabbinic officiation at same-sex commitment ceremonies (1996). In the early part of the first century, it is unlikely that the Synaxis would have been recognizably different from the Synagogue service except for the setting.
