Restorative Nursing Program (RNP) refers to nursing interventions that promote the resident's ability to adapt and adjust to living as independently and safely as possible. This concept actively focuses on achieving and maintaining optimal physical, mental, and psychosocial functioning.

1. Measurable objectives and interventions must be documented in the care plan.

Restorative Nursing Under PDPM - Part 1 | Proactive ...

The risk for ADL decline in long-term care residents is a serious issue that often leads to falls, pressure ulcers, weight loss, depression, and other negative outcomes. To ensure quality outcomes and to comply with federal regulation, nursing facilities must have a comprehensive and effective restorative program that encourages each resident's highest level of function.

Guide to Successful Restorative Programs

Restorative programming includes nursing interventions and must be overseen by a licensed nurse. While CMS does not require a formal training or certification for restorative nurses, there may be state requirements. However, it is essential that the nurses overseeing the restorative program have the competency required for this position.

Utilizing Restorative Nursing Programs to Optimize ...

- Range of motion must be delivered by staff who are trained in the procedure
- The use of continuous passive motion (CPM) devices in a restorative nursing program is coded when the following criteria are met: (1) ordered by a physician, (2) nursing staff have been trained in technique, and (3) monitoring of the device.

○ Nursing staff should document the application of the devices and the effects on the resident

Structuring Your Restorative Nursing Program-2

"A resident may be started on a restorative nursing program when he or she is admitted to the facility with restorative needs, but is not a candidate for formalized rehabilitation therapy, or when restorative needs arise during the course of a longer-term stay, or in conjunction with formalized rehabilitation therapy.

Successful Restorative Program - PHCA

CMS is delaying the Minimum Data Set (MDS) 3.0 v1.18.1 release, which had been scheduled for October 1, 2020, in response to stakeholder concerns. The MDS item sets are used by Nursing Home and Swing Bed providers to collect and submit patient data to CMS. This MDS data informs payment, quality, and the survey process.
